What is Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC)?

A clinical practice that uses various methods of communication that can help people whose verbal speech or physical ability to handwrite does not meet their daily communication needs. AAC methods vary and may be personalized to meet each individual's needs. For instance, using technology to support or replace speech and/or handwriting, using simple strategies to get attention, communicate using pictures, using your voice to type, using your eyes to type and mouse or using any body part to control a computer using a switch. Each client is unique. We listen to your communication needs and come up with a plan that works for you.

Who Can Benefit from AAC?

- Adults who have speech problems that are so severe that they are not understood by others
- Adults who are unable to speak at all
- Adults who have physical difficulties that prevent them from using their hands to write or use a computer

Why?

The ultimate goal of AAC assessment and intervention is not the use of technology, it is to find a solution to a severe communication disability so that people can interact with family, friends and in their community and participate in activities of their choice.

Services Provided

The best technology fit is determined through matching physical and communication skills and needs of the individual to the features of communication equipment.

- Face-to-face Communication Assessment
- Written Communication Assessment
- AAC equipment is prescribed by an OT and SLP
- Equipment is customized for each individual
- AAC devices may be mounted to allow access where ever the client spends time
- Training is provided to the person using AAC
- Training is provided to communication partners
- As communication needs change, re-assessment is required
- If/when communication equipment doesn't work, troubleshooting support is provided

Referrals

- A referral from a physician or Nurse Practitioner is required.

Admission Criteria

- Valid Ontario Health Card
- 18 years or older
- Speech and/or handwriting does not meet daily communication needs

Funding for Communication Devices

- There is no fee for the services provided by the AAC Clinic
- If eligible, the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care Assistive Devices Program (ADP) may provide funding assistance for the purchase or lease of prescribed communication aids
- Funding assistance may be available through the Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) and various organizations such as Ontario Federation of Cerebral Palsy and ALS Canada
