CHILDCARE RELIEF IN SIGHT FOR HEALTHCARE WORKERS

In another measure announced by the Province on Sunday, designated day care centres are being exempted from the closure order. This is so they can care for the children of health sector and front-line emergency workers.

The move responds to concerns that doctors, nurses and other staff are experiencing difficulties managing their work and home lives without help on the child care front. The provincial government recognizes this move as an "all hands on deck approach" for healthcare workers to focus on flattening the COVID-19 curve and providing the healthcare necessary to achieve this.

The day care centres will have contingency plans in place if a staff member or child contracts COVID-19 and numbers of children in each location will be kept low.

Once the centres are open, a list will be made public at Ontario.ca/coronavirus.

HOSPITAL-BASED LABS MOBILIZE TO TEST FOR COVID-19 TO ALLEVIATE BACKLOG

According to a *Globe and Mail* article on March 21:

- Ontario has a backlog of more than 7,200 tests as of Saturday and results are taking nearly a week to come back in some cases.
- To help address the problem, researchers at Toronto's Mount Sinai Hospital and the University Health Network are teaming up to re-purpose hospital research labs for COVID-19 testing.
- The hope is that in the days and weeks ahead, the labs could process an increasing number of tests, which could take some of the pressure off stretched public health labs.
- The move is necessary in order to get ahead of the virus.
- The longer term goal is to develop new testing methods that could allow labs to potentially process 10,000 to 20,000 tests a day.

SCREENING CONTINUES
